In addition, the Rural Life Committee held a BBQ on the Thursday night before the meeting and served us a delicious country supper with speakers and musical entertainment. There were over 30 youth from Grade 7 – 12 and children in grades Kindergarten to Grade 6 who participated in programs designed for them to 'Think on These Things'.

We were blessed to have various guests with us. We had Yvonne Stewart representing Five Oaks and Patti Talbot brought Conference to co-host the 43rd General Council in 2018. Jackie Childerhose from Grand River Bookstore brought a good selection of material for the bookroom.

We acknowledged the land of the First Nations whose territory we were meeting on and Charlene Catchpole was here representing the Ojibway First Nation. Conference President, Don Stiles, invited us to 'Think on These Things' and this theme ran through the whole Conference from the graphics provided by youth to presentations by the various committees to the speeches by those preparing for ordination. Don asked delegates to

break into groups so that they could consider the ways that the lines in this scripture passage might apply to Bay of Quinte Conference now and in the time to come as the church as a whole decides what the future will look like.

On Friday afternoon an original play called 'Transcripts' was performed for us by Faith and Arts Ottawa. Based on real stories, 'Transcripts' follows characters adapting to radical changes in themselves and their loved ones. There was some powerful discussion with the court afterwards.

Bay of Quinte Conference had 11 people retire this year and we were lucky to be able to honour 8 of them at the Retiree's Banquet on Friday evening. Incoming Conference President, Wanda Stride, organized a delightful evening with a meal, musical entertainment and speeches by the retirees. Rev. Jamie York continued our tradition of 'piping' our special guests into the room.

Saturday began with a lovely Taize style worship that included memorials for the clergy that passed away during this Conference year. Then we got down to business hearing reports and considering and voting on several ballots. The group that went to El Salvador in March told us about their travels and we learned about the United Nations Declaration on the Right of Indigenous Peoples (UNDRIP) from Romeo Saganish, MP, Abitibi-Baie-James-Nunavik-Eeyoa riding northern Quebec with a powerful presentation.



The Annual Meeting wrapped up on Sunday with more discussion on the theme and tidying up business. And finally, the Celebration of Ministry Service ordained Janelle Shaw, Edward Wells, Lynne Gardiner and Michael Putnam and admitted Richard Hamilton to ministry in Bay of Quinte Conference with Malcolm Sinclair of First Metropolitan United Church in Toronto delivering the sermon. ### MISSION TRIP TO

he reasons we went were varied. Some went to help. Some went to learn. Some went to deepen faith. Some were strongarmed by their daughters.

Whatever the reason, 24 faithful Bay of Quinte Conference souls traveled to El Salvador over the March Break, 2017, eager to meet our partner church and to build relationships. When we returned seven days later, we were rich with experience, friendships, and commitments to stand in solidarity with our Salvadoran brothers and sisters in Christ.

Fifteen-year-old Rachel Vollmer from Lakefield United Church was amazed at how quickly friendships formed, even with people who did not speak the same language. "We had in common one thing: God. The power of the Holy Spirit works in mysterious ways," she said.

Port Perry's 17-year-old Quinton Weyrich agreed. "This trip made me realize how secular Canadian society is, in comparison to this nation where every passing bus seemed to bear an image of Jesus or the Virgin Mary. I'm not sure how I feel about that, but it's definitely something I've been noticing a bit more now."

The group of 12 youth and 12 adults stayed at the Centro Gabriel para la paz, a civilwar orphanage turned retreat centre in the hills surrounding the capital city of San Salvador.

The lush forest setting offered us a quiet sanctuary in the middle of this bustling, noisy Central American country. It also offered a place for quiet reflection as some group members learned of horrific violence and loss - from stories of the civil war, but also stories of today, as a younger generation of Salvadorans live with the reality of gang violence.

Jean Stairs is minister at Edith Rankin United Church in Kingston, a congregation that recently became partners with Emmanuel Baptist Church (IBE). While visiting mission sites in a remote rural community, Jean met a young mother who had been beaten by the local police.

"(The police) assumed she was assisting some gang members," Jean said. "In actual fact, she was being polite with the gang members in order to stay safe and not be subjected to violence from them!" The young woman's cuts and bruises were still visible on her face, two weeks after the incident. "I witnessed (IBE) Pastor Miguel's anger at the injustice."

While her church had already proven its commitment to IBE, this particular incident demonstrated a new level of that partnership. "It is important to remain vigilant, advocate for the oppressed and for us to stand in solidarity with them in their hopefulness that

transformation toward peace is possible."

El Salvador can be the first or third most violent country in the world, on a given week. People here still live behind locked gates and barbed wire fences as rival gangs and police fight for control of the streets and communities. Last year the murder rate peaked at one per hour. This violent reality has prompted some local leaders, like IBE's Miguel Castro, to devote their lives to creating a culture of peace.

Emmanuel **Baptist** Church, much like many Canadian churches, is not a huge congregation. Anywhere from 40 to 100 people can gather twice a week to worship and pray. But the work of this small church is far-reaching and important. They are developing and staffing ten mission sites, both urban and rural, with chapels, community youth centres and schools. Our group was able to witness two rural communities, and learn about the scholarship fund administered by the church, and Lidia Mendes, Pastor Miguel's wife. This year churches individuals. and presbyteries from the west end of Bay of Quinte Conference sponsored eight students ranging in age from seven to 15. After this trip, Edith Rankin has also made а five-year commitment to raise several thousand dollars annually.

In communities where

workers can earn \$3 a day working at coffee plantations, the scholarships are essential for keeping children in school. Education is important, and so is dignity.

Juan Jose Romero is mayor of Mercedes Umaña, a rural municipality south east of San Salvador. He told us that over the past two years they have built a library and

created a symphony orchestra. We visited a bakery run by young men. With all these efforts, and by helping to keep children in school, the gang presence in that community has been virtually eliminated, according to Mayor Romero.

Edith Rankin's Nick Gazendam also witnessed the power of the "Peacemakers", a group of young leaders in a school affiliated with IBE. "They and other youth from the church spent many hours with us, sharing music, laughter, tears, and limitless hugs. These young people are the leaven that can transform this place."

Our guide and host, Juan Ramón Valencia Portillo, demonstrated the love of his people with humour, and a uniquely generous spirit. Many on this trip will remember his face as he took pictures, organized trips and made sure we were safe. He stayed with us sometimes 12 hours each day, knowing that his wife Lady Conde was dying of cancer.

The generosity of our hosts, their capacity for love, hospitality and their deep faith, may be the main takeaway for our group. Despite their struggles, their own vulnerability, they sacrificed time and scheduling to be with us, to learn about our lives, and to share their own experiences.

"I will always remember Miguel, and I think anyone who has met him knows that nothing more needs to be said," said 17-year-Hope Pascoe old from Newcastle United Church. "(I see) God at work everywhere and present in every moment a result of what I experienced on this trip."

Bay of Quinte Conference is planning to send another delegation to El Salvador in the next two years. If you are interested in visiting our sister church there, please contact the conference office.

Trinity St. Andrew's Church in Renfrew is a lovely spacious location. The theme was "Celebrating Spirit" and the theme song was VU 380 – "She Flies On". And we did, starting with greetings from UCW Upper Valley President Lee Torvi, Trinity St. Andrew's Minister, Andrew Love, Sheryl McLeod and First Nations greetings from Roberta Della Picca.


The offering this year, of \$893.00, was given to International Children's Awareness in Cameroon.

Worship was presented by Four Winds Presbyterial using the parable of the Good Samaritan. Our guest speaker was Jeff Lehoux who works with the International Children's Awareness group that visits Cameroon at least once a year. The group is made up of 15 to 20 core members. The funds raised by the group go towards helping the people that live there empower

themselves with vocations that can be taught to others and for them to be more self-sustaining. Jeff is a retired Army Veteran who helps bring together other retired veterans with skills to help build bridges in flood areas. Since 2009, 16 schools have been constructed using local labour who are paid less than \$1.00 a day for 18 hours of work. To visit you require a visa. It is not a country that has had a lot of exposure to the rest of the world but slowly they are being helped with critical areas that are adding to their quality of life. You can't go with the thought of what you want to do. Go to see what is needed and then try to get help to make it happen. A local coffee called SNARK is sold by the group with 10% of the profits going back to ICA.

Communion and the Offering were next followed by a Fair Trade report from Marilyn Rodger. We were reminded that 10% of all sales go to Mission & Service and in 2016 that totaled over \$1,000.00.
